The students and staff braved the rain on the Friday before Halloween to enjoy a costume parade. Students from grades K-7 dressed up and looked fantastic!


The day was a bit strange considering Principal Sutch was 'away'





The Spring conferences should be another great opportunity to share and reflect on student learning!










Halloween How!!!

Literacy Intervention Teachers are providing opportunities for children to tell about themselves as readers which helps strengthen their personal reading identities and build independent reading lives.






International

IT Department Update – November 2021

It has been a very busy fall with normal school start-up activities including teacher device rollouts, Chromebook power washing, refreshing school support staff devices, student account creation, synchronizing key education applications, and supporting people through our HelpDesk.

Here is a quick summary of the projects we have been working on and/or completed during the summer and fall:

- 3. Powerwash Chromebooks (3,100)
- 4. Deploy iPads for teachers (55+)
- 5. Deploy Chromebooks at Kal
- 6. Replace support staff devices in schools
- 7. Draft new security policies and IT standards for the District
- 8. Respond to Help support tickets since Sept'21(1,800+)
- 9. Respond to Help support phone calls since Sep'21 (1,100+)
- 10. Automation of data refresh for EdPlan Insight, AIMS, School Messenger, Insignia
- 11. Ongoing manual refresh for KEV, MyBlueprint, Traversa
- 12. Automate creation of student accounts for Office 365
- 13. Automate creation of student accounts and permissions for Goggle for Education.
- 14. Automating security updates for our data centre and school servers
- 15. Development of a Defensible Security framework
- 16. Development and implementation of automatic security threat blocking.
