TOUR ANNOUNCEMENT – School District 22 was delighted to host Minister of Education and Child Care, Honourable Rachna Singh on Tuesday, May 16th. Minister Singh toured Venture Training where she experienced the process of creating our Brown Bag lunches for students, then on to Alexis Park Elementary School to tour the new playground, note its' accessible features, and announce more recipients of the provincial Playground Equipment Program (PEP). She also had an opportunity to speak with some of our senior students about antiracism. A huge thank you to MLA Harvinder Sandhu, who was also in attendance, in addition to Board Chair Gen Acton, Alexis Park PAC Chair, Laura Tifenbach; all the Alexis Park drummers and singers, our MCs Gabe and Alison, Principal Ware, our high school Student Voice representatives, and all others in attendance.

Accessible British Columbia Act — School District 22, under the leadership of Director of Instruction - Inclusion, Christine Love, is currently creating an Accessibility Committee who will assist the district in identifying barriers and advise on how to remove and prevent barriers to those individuals in the district and to those who interact with the district. The committee may include members from inside or outside of the district. Committee membership should ideally reflect the diversity of persons in BC and have at least one Indigenous person, and half of the members should ideally:

- be persons with disabilities; or,
- represent an organization that supports persons with disabilities.

Strong consideration will be given to persons who are best suited to advise on how to enhance meaningful participation by the community. Our accessibility plan will state how the school district will identify, remove, and prevent barriers to those in our district and those who interact with it. In developing or updating our district's plan, we will consult with the accessibility committee and consider specific principles:

- Inclusion
- Adaptability
- Diversity
- Collaboration
- Self-determination
- Universal design

Anti-Racism Action Plan - Our district is currently working on a roll out of Anti-racism education across the district for the 2023-2024 school year. The Learning Team, under the leadership of Director of Instruction – Learning, Luke Friesen, will lead this critical work.

Learning together through experience and collaboration has provided both opportunities and challenges that will guide us moving forward. Over the next two months PVP will communicate and discuss with staff and families the new guidelines in preparation for implementation next school year. I also want to thank everyone who participated in the district CSL Committee over the past 4 years helping shape these changes and challenge things along the way."

Early Learning & Child Care – We are delighted to announce SD 22 has been selected as part of the *Integration Inquiry Project* with the Ministry of Education and Child Care. The Integration Inquiry Project will explore the role of school districts in expanding child care on school grounds, discover the complexities of blending child care and education cultures through a single service delivery location, and emphasize quality early childhood education experiences. This project brings \$880,000 per year (2.64 million over three years) into the district and will be under the leadership of Assistant Superintendent, Katherine Oviatt and District Principal of Early Learning, Jennifer Friesen. SD 22 joins Peace River North and West Vancouver in this project.

Expanding K-12 Career Development and Dual Credit - <u>Budget 2023</u> confirmed over \$1.4B in investments in Future Ready and B.C.'s <u>Health Human Resources Strategy</u>, which commits to implementing new career development initiatives and expanding dual credit programming. This work will complement and build on the <u>Early Childhood Education Dual Credit project</u>, under the ChildCareBC plan, which currently includes 30 participating school districts and will continue to expand over the next two years. More information on these initiatives, as well as further clarification from the Ministry on dual credit funding eligibility, will follow in the coming weeks.

Feeding Futures School Food Programs Funding

The BC government has committed \$214.5 million in operating funding over three years to make sure all students are fed and ready to learn, by expanding existing school food programs in districts and schools that already have them and creating new ones in districts and schools without. School District 22 will receive approximately 1 million dollars. More information will be provided at the May public meeting.

Find Your Fit: We thank WorkBC for bringing their travelling road show to our district on May 1st & 2nd. This year grade 6 & 7 students from Lavington, JW Inglis, Ellison, OKL, Alexis Park, BX, Beairsto, Harwood, Mission Hill were invited to attend. Thank you to Principal Mccagno and the Lavington staff for accommodating this excellent learning opportunity. Thank you also to Career Programs and the SD 22 Transportation department.

Innovate-Ed 2023 - This year, SD22 is excited to host *Innovate-Ed 2023*, BC's premier educational technology conference, on October 20 at VSS. <u>InnovateED23</u> is currently seeking conference proposals from educators and professionals interested in sharing innovative ideas in education that may leverage technology to enhance and deepen learning for students. The selection committee is looking for sessions that are highly engaging, allow participants to be active, and grounded in sound educational pedagogy. Sexual Health (Consent) education requirements - On March 6, the B.C. government introduced legislation to protect people whose intimate images are shared online without their consent. To support this legislation and to reflect feedback from educators, students, and the broader community, the Ministry of Education and Childcare, in consultation with BCTF teachers and partner Ministries, has updated the PHE curriculum and the Supporting Student Health Guide. This guide is available for both elementary and secondary schools.

We are pleased to say that School District 22 successfully rolled out *Consent Education* to all Grade 11 and 12 students this year and an Elementary version to all Elementary schools. Consent includes knowing and respecting a person's own boundaries as well as the boundaries of others. Thank you to Assistant Superintendent, Katherine Oviatt, for her leadership in this work.

TRC & Indigenous Graduation Requirements – coming this Fall

The new Indigenous-focused graduation requirement, which will ensure that all secondary school students graduate with knowledge of Indigenous cultures and perspectives, will be mandatory in September. Track and field is in full swing. Beairsto had their day at the track – it began with a warm up led by Mr Helm.



Scott Belshaw has been involved with a residency focused on students understanding and demonstrating growth in both the core and curricular competencies. The two Hillview teachers, Hawley Anderson and Pam Schoepp along with Scott, started by focusing on the students developing, sharing, reflecting and setting goals for the curricular competencies in science and social studies. They decided that integrating communication, personal and social awareness and responsibility was integral to the processes as well.

As their understanding of the competencies grew over time, they began to encourage the learners to interact and make connections to these skills in English Language Arts and Physical and Health Education. What started as a very pointed and specific residency morphed into a holistic and cross-curricular venture.

Inclusive Education Department











Everyday Anxiety Strategies for Educators (EASE) is a universal classroom program, which can be used at all three tiers of intervention. The evidence informed program was created by the Ministry of Children and Families in conjunction with Anxiety Canada and BC educators. This spring, the Inclusive Education Department created EASE kits for all elementary schools to ensure that trained teachers had the materials readily available for program implementation. This spring between 100 and 200 students a week were enrolled in Community based learning opportunities. These learning opportunities included glass making at Vernon Art Center, swimming lessons, an afternoon at the Vernon Science Center, and monthly gatherings of AAC game days. Beginning in May we are starting weekly bike rides on the rail trail, and rock climbing as well as weekly community trips to sites such as O'Keefe ranch, Winfield Easter Seals camp and many more exciting adventures!
