Communicating Student Learning

The BC Ministry of Education and Child Care (MoECC) introduced a new K – 12 Student Reporting Policy which came into effect this school year. Student reporting is the assessment and communication of student learning. The goal of communicating student learning (CSL) is to ensure that:

- students take part in meaningful conversations that help them develop responsibility for engaging deeply with their learning.
- parents and caregivers are well informed, are involved in decisions and dialogue about their child's learning and understand ways to support and further their child's learning.

Our enrolment for the 2023-2024 school year is: 9115 plus 271 International students for a total enrolment of 9386. Last year's total enrolment in September was 9292.

Students spent the next week learning about Terry Fox and raising money and awareness for cancer research. We finished off the week with the Terry Fox run in the school yard on a beautiful sunny afternoon. We finished September with a focus on Truth and Reconciliation and celebrated Orange Shirt Day with assemblies planned and run by students. Students learned about the Four Food Chiefs, residential schools and some actions to take to participate in reconciliation.









Harwood Elementary

Our school kept Terry's dream alive and held another successful Terry Fox run in our community. Harwood raised over one dollar per student in Terry's honor!

We were also the recipients of a wonderful surprise when a hot air balloon came for a visit to tell our students all about the wonderful world of flying around the beautiful Vernon area in a massive hot air balloon.







We finished off the month by hosting an Orange Shirt Day assembly to commemorate the Indigenous families that were impacted by the residential school experience. We gathered as a whole school community, welcomed by Mrs. Dacyk's class and Mrs. Scholz drumming and singing the Okanagan Song to our schools' entry. Then, we engaged in meaningful conversation around the purpose of Orange Shirt Day, watched Harwood students present a hoop dance routine, listened to commitments to Truth and Reconciliation by grade 7 students, and left to the beating of the drums.






Fulton Family of Schools










Truth and Reconciliation Day saw a flood of orange shirts worn and the flag was flying at half-mast to commemorate the day.



Orange shirts, designed by students, were featured at the School Board Office in the month of September.


Human Resources

Student Learning


