Superintendent Report – April 2022

Communications Audit and Inventory Update: Thirteen internal stakeholder interviews have been conducted with key district staff, including senior leadership, Trustees and a selection of school Principals and Vice-Principals. The interview process aims to better understand the matrix of communication practices currently in place. In addition, a communications campaign called “22 Ways we are Going Green” is underway, that aims to encourage both employee pride and recognition, and to also inform the strategic planning process.

Ministry staff also continue to meet with sector partners to gather their input. Kindergarten immunization clinic dates - Interior Health

Congratulations on registering your child in Kindergarten! Most children will be due for a Kindergarten vaccine before they start school in September. Schools now require a copy of your child's immunization records. Kindergarten Immunization Clinics will be held **May 5 and 6 and June 2 and 3, 2022** at the Vernon Health Centre. New Name - Ministry of Education and Child Care (MoECC). Government's commitment to move child care (formerly Ministry of Children and Family Development) into our Ministry of Education has resulted in the combined as the Ministry of Education and Child Care to help ensure a more successful and seamless transition for B.C. children into the K-12 system. This move aligns with other governance models for child care across the country while also positioning the Ministry to better serve and respond to the needs of our community and education partners, childcare providers, advocates, parents, and ultimately the children of B.C. It is a natural and fitting transition **recognizing that** early learning and child care as a foundational part of every child's learning journey.

Online Learning - The Ministry of Education and Child Care has decided to extend the implementation timeline for the public Provincial Online Learning Schools (POLS) to July 1, 2023.

What this means for students and families:

- Students can continue in their district online schools for 2022/23 and will not need to transition.
- Families will have flexibility to choose to remain in their current online school or move to another district online school.
- Transition planning timelines are extended an additional year.
- Families will know by the end of this school year which schools will have POLS designations.
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What this means for Online Schools:

School District's and their Online Learning School/s will receive an extension to the Interim Agreement with the Minister for the 2022/23 school year, and all Interim Online Learning policies will remain in effect until June 30, 2023;

The Ministry will be communicating with those School Districts who expressed interest to become a public Provincial Online Learning School about next steps. Our district did NOT express an interest in being a Provincial Online Learning School as we want to focus on what we do best and believe *vLearn* is an excellent school and online learning program.

All current online schools (public and independent) will continue to operate under the interim online learning agreements for the 2022/23 school year. Public provincial online learning schools will be notified before the end of the 2021/22 school year. All provincial online learning schools will be operational by September 2023 (2023/24 school year).

We were so happy and excited to welcome students, families, and staff back to school on April 4th after spring break. We missed our students so much!

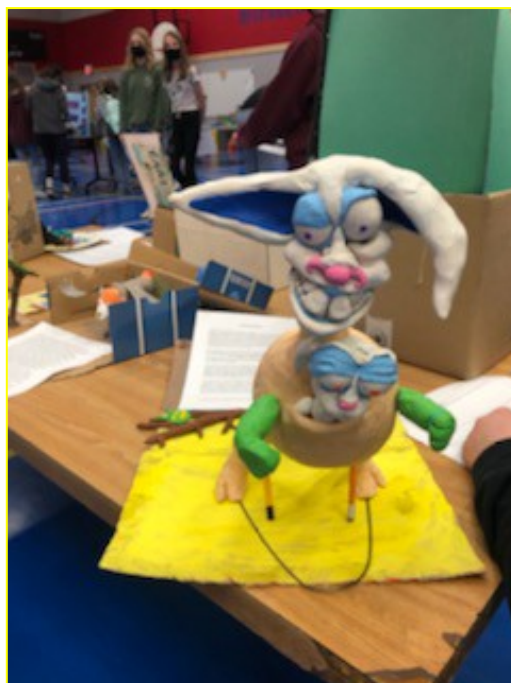
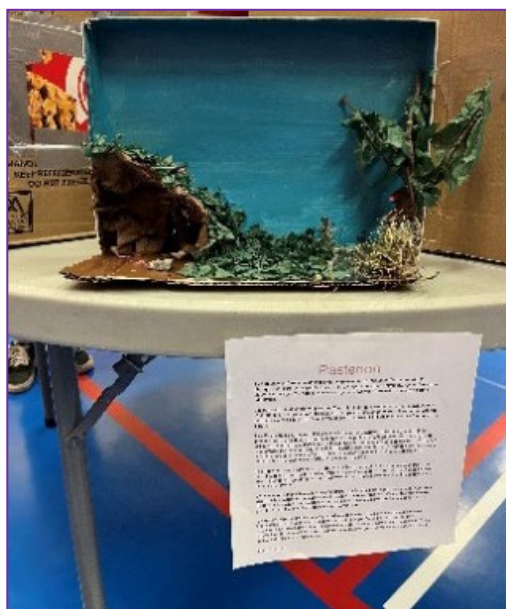

Beairsto Elementary

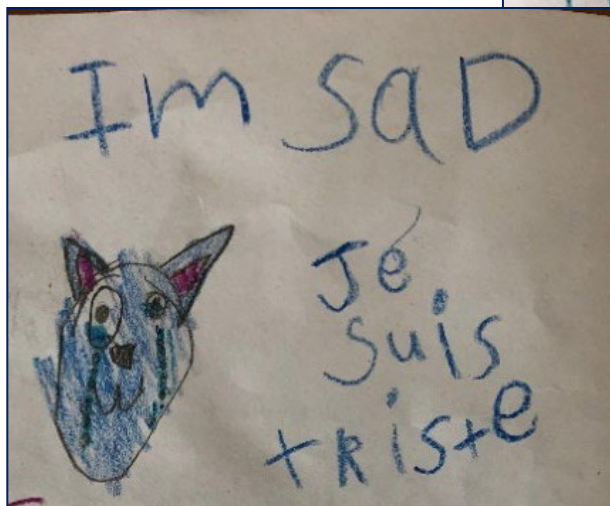
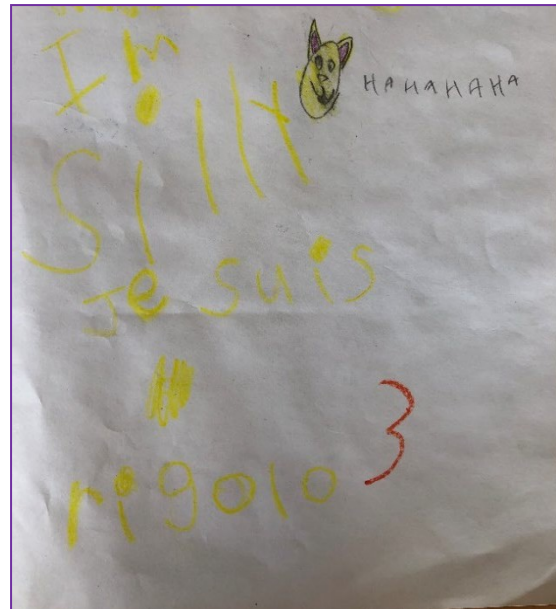
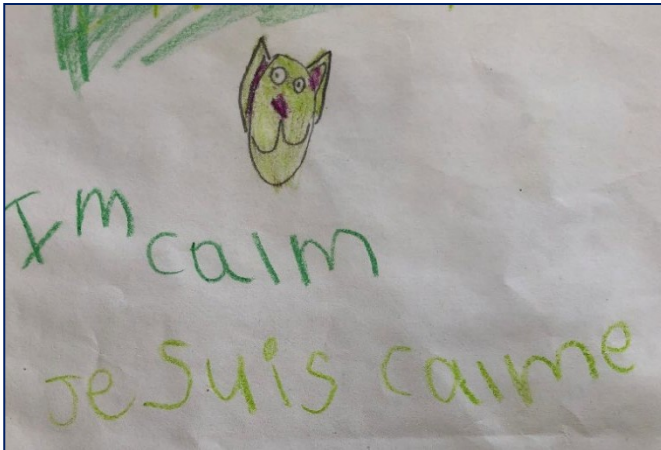

Our elementary students had a fantastic tour of the Coldstream Fire Hall. I see future firefighters in our students – we'll be in good hands!

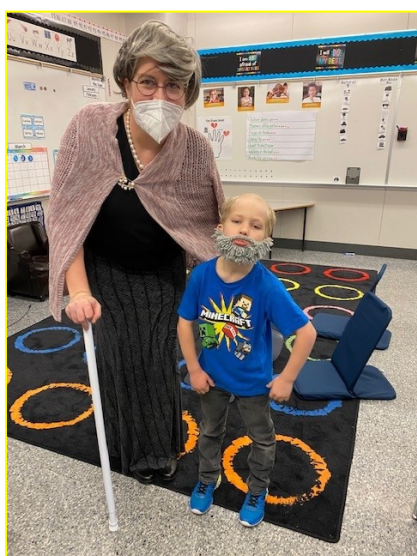




BX Elementary

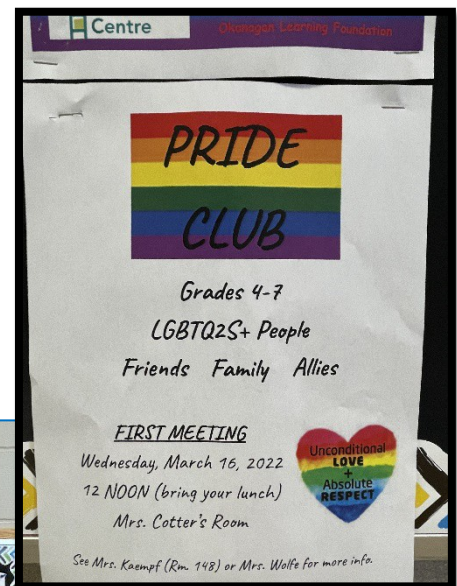

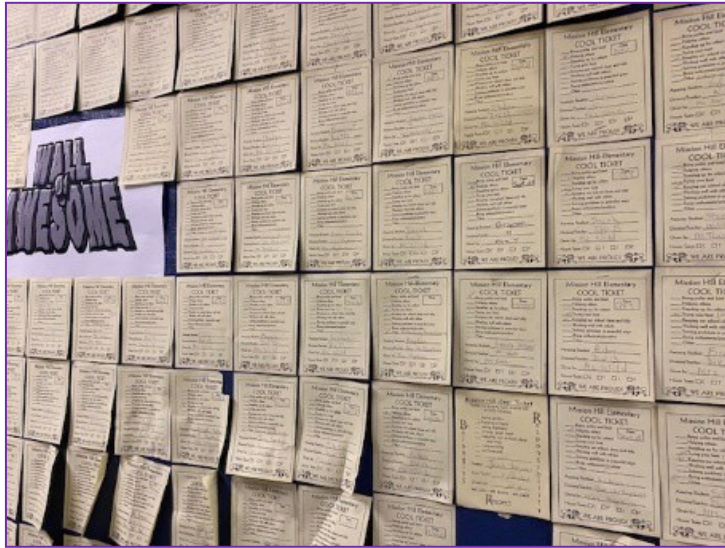


We are happy to welcome classes back to school and our students are ready to learn and reconnect with their classmates.

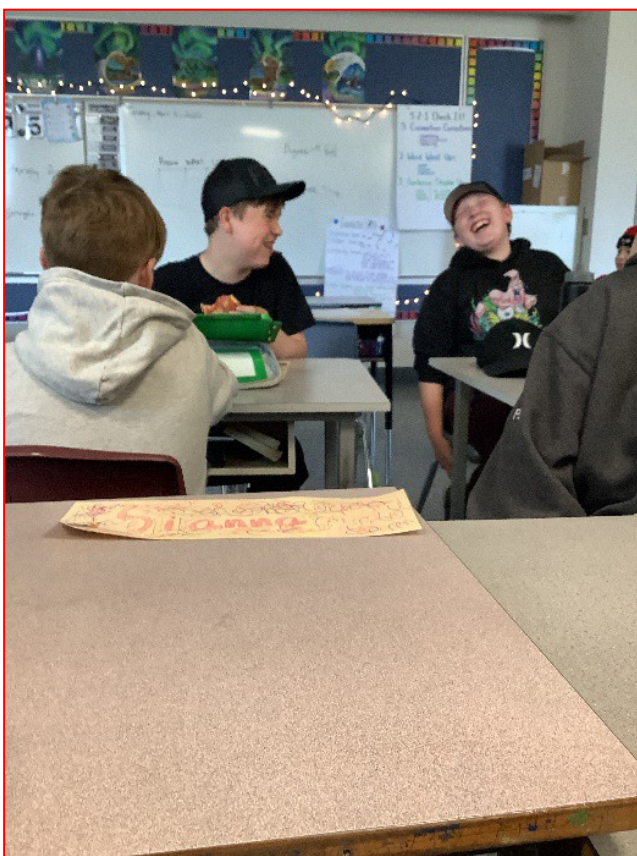




Lavington Elementary

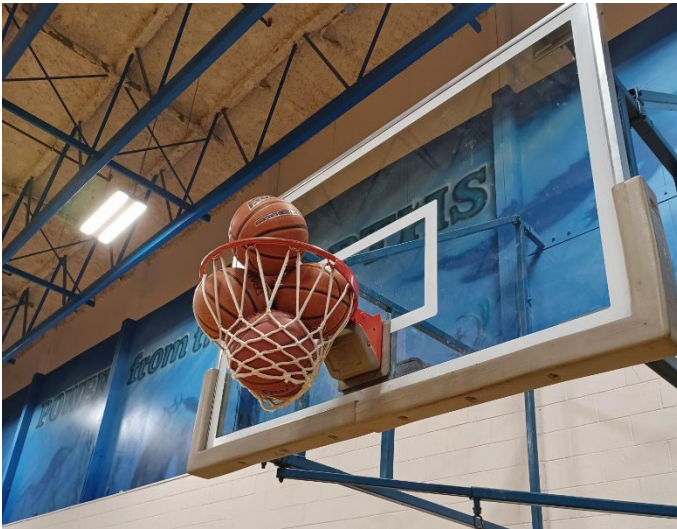




Kalamalka Secondary

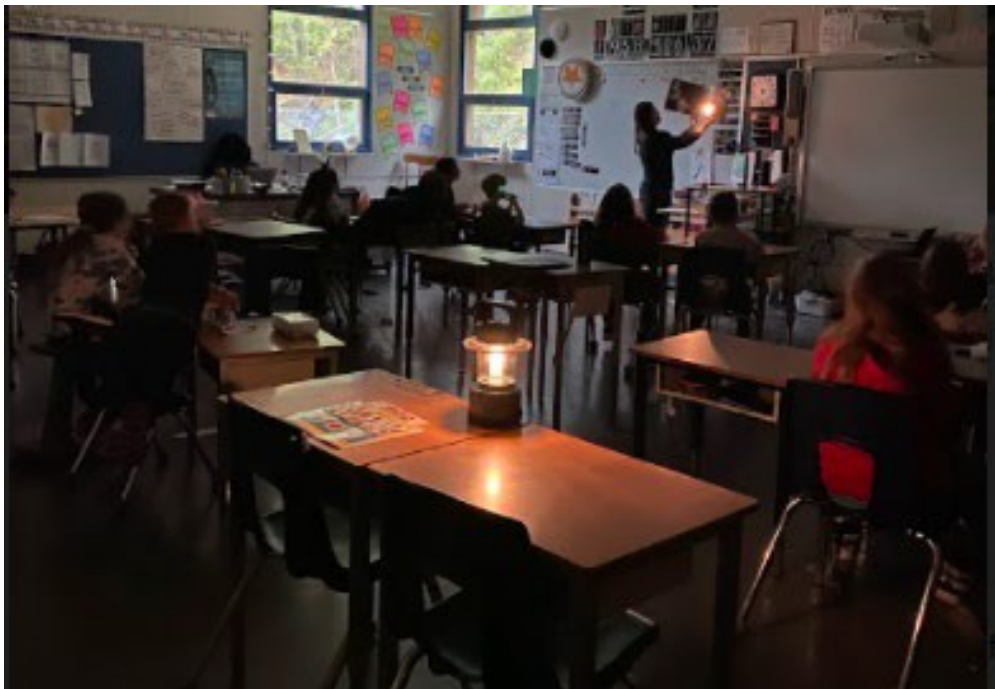

We were able to have a whole school assembly which was very exciting! It was a great boost to school spirit.



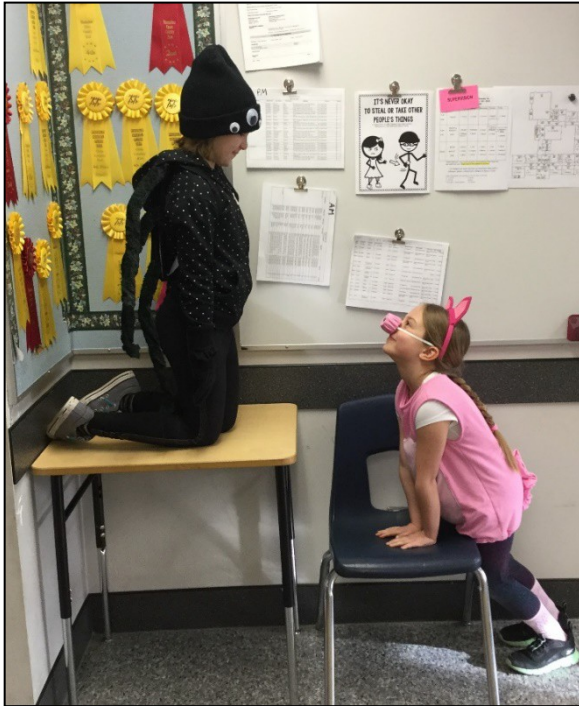
Our K/1 class is doing a cross curricular unit on Fairy Tales. This group is acting out the Three Billy Goat's Gruff.

Student Learning Curriculum



The Communicating Student Learning Committee met in March to review the K-12 Ministry of Education What-We-Hear-Report. From this, meaningful discussions, and reflections on the district's journey through this pilot helped identify areas of growth and challenges as we continue forward. Danielle Calder (Technology Innovation Coordinator) provided a presentation on electronic portfolios highlighting the districts journey as well as how electronic portfolios can support personalized learning, student agency and encourage ongoing communication with families.

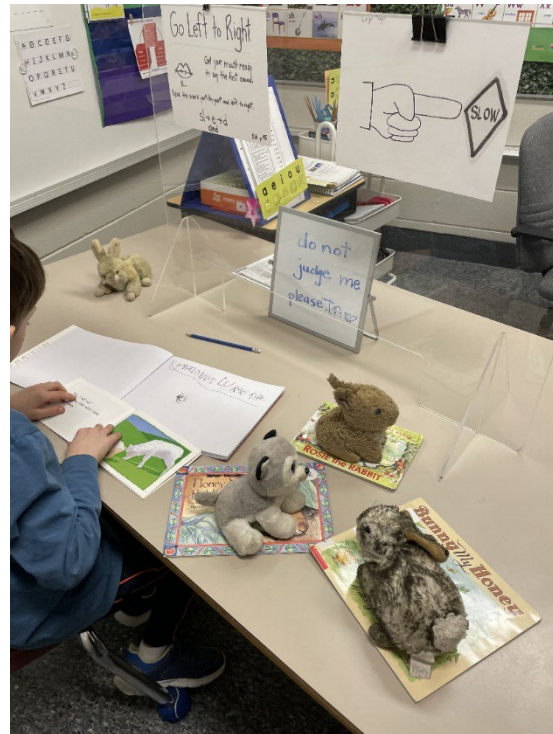




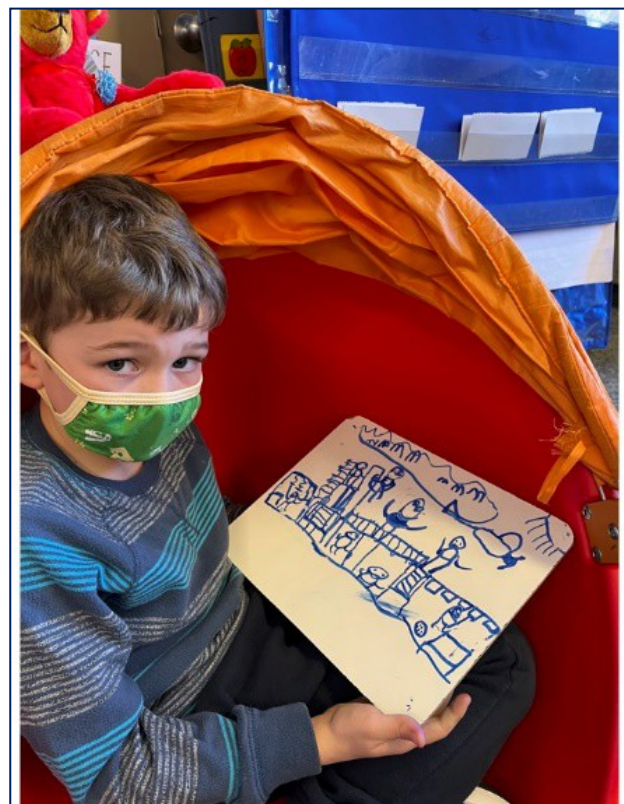

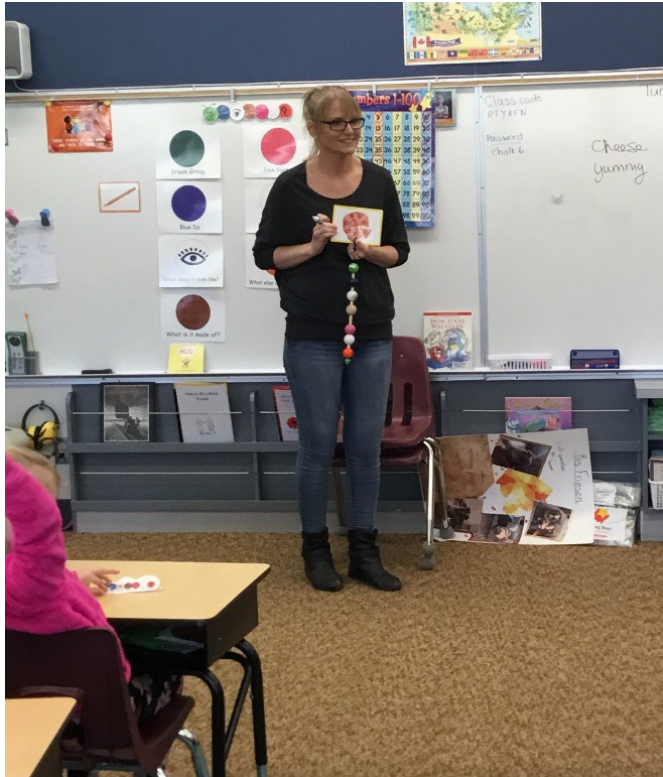


Student Support Service



Many students throughout our district use Augmentative and Alternative Communication (AAC) as their primary mode of communication because they may be non-verbal (do not talk), minimally verbal (have limited expressive vocabulary), unintelligible (speech is difficult to understand), or use mostly echolalic (non-purposeful repetition of words just spoken by another person or recalled from previous event) speech verbally. James Pollock is one of our

amazing AAC users at Ellison Elementary School. He struggles with talking verbally due to Childhood Apraxia of Speech (CAS). With SLP therapy and a very supportive family, James now communicates independently using his talker (TouchChat app on his iPad) which he carries everywhere with him and through some sign language. He receives direct SLP support to work on improving his speech productions as well and has been a rockstar in sessions!



Our district SLPs support students through a tiered approach. SLPs collaborate with teachers and can work within the classroom to support all students at a Tier 1 level. District SLP, Leah Clark, is seen here conducting in-class support using the Expanding Expression Tool (EET) with a grade 2/3 class at Silver Star Elementary School.



A lot of our students, particularly in our elementary schools, have articulation (speech sound production) difficulties and benefit from individual or small group articulation therapy. Our SLPs have trained and supervise 3 District Education Assistants (EAs) to help support students with articulation practice 2-3 days a week for 7-week blocks of time. Pictured is one of our District EAs, Lianne Funk, supporting 2 students at J.W. Inglis Elementary School with producing target speech sounds.

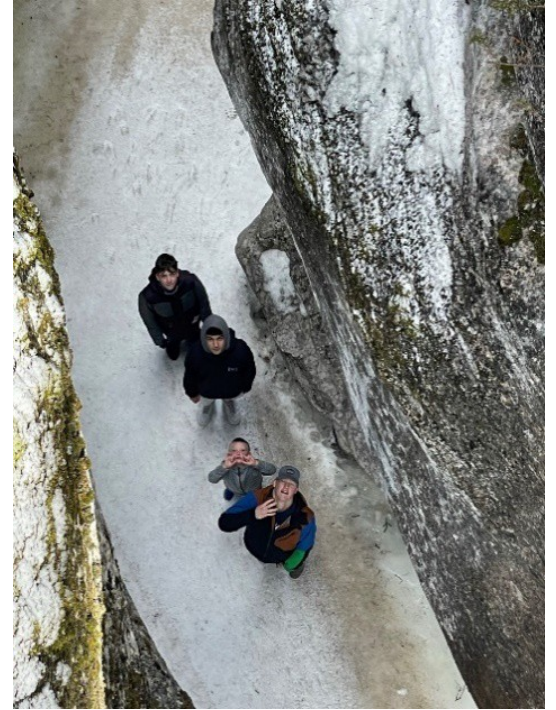

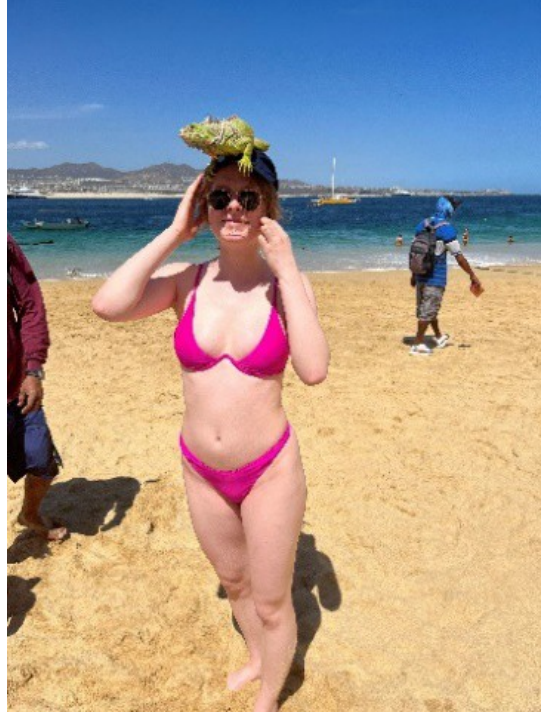

Highlight Project: Chromebook Replacement	
The district currently has approximately 3500 Chromebooks deployed. Most of these are used by students. 95% of our Chromebooks are currently being used on a weekly basis which shows an extremely high rate of utilization.	
<i>Over the next 6 months, approximately 900 of the Chromebooks will reach the end of their support life. Replacement of these devices is well underway and will be completed by September 2022</i>	
In addition to the 3,500 Chromebooks, we provide over 1,300 iPads, and over 500 laptops/desktops for students.	
Other IT Projects – Update	
Business Process Automation	The department has been streamlining and automating several administrative processes to increase efficiency, increase service, and decrease paper. The processes that we have been working on this month include new account creation, new device requests, and device returns. The IT Department is close to completing the testing of these new workflows and expect to go live in May 2022.
School Based Tech Planning	The IT and Curriculum departments have completed the new framework for school-based Ed-Tech planning. We are currently working on migrating the entire process into a website. The draft website has been completed and is expected to go live in May 2022
Single Sign On: Google for Education	Plans are underway to synchronize our traditional login system with Google for Education. This means that students can login just once to access key district resources including the network, wireless, Office 365 and

	<i>Google for Education. This project will be executed in the summer.</i>
<i>District Wireless Refresh</i>	<i>The district is currently working with vendors to refresh our current wireless infrastructure in all schools. The project involves replacing all switches and access points related to the wireless infrastructure. It is expected that this project will take 3 years to complete.</i>
