Assessment & Reporting - K-12 Student Reporting Policy Information for Families

Secondary Report Cards should have been available since February 8th. If you need assistance seeing your child's Report on MyEdBC, please contact your school Principal.

The K-12 Student Reporting Policy Framework ("the framework") is the result of extensive consultation and engagement with the education sector, including rightsholders, partners, teachers, parents, caregivers, students, and the public. The framework provides an overview of the upcoming changes to the Student Reporting Policy, set to be implemented in the 2023/24 school year.

What's new:

- Student reporting practices that align with B.C.'s curriculum and provincial assessment system
- Ensuring timely and responsive feedback on student learning that parents can understand.
- Provincial Proficiency Scale at Grades K-9
- Graduation status update at Grades 10-12
- Student self-assessment and goal setting in all grades in the 3 written reports
- Changing the "I" reporting symbol to "IE" to denote "insufficient evidence" of learning instead of "incomplete" learning.
- All learners, including students with a disability or diverse ability, will receive regular communications of student learning in the same way as their peers in any other program.

What's the same:

- 5 communications of student learning; 3 written and 2 of flexible format
- Written descriptive feedback to accompany scale or letter grade/percentage.
- Letter grades and percentages at Grades 10-12

Cell Phone Restrictions

SD 22 is pleased to say that we already include digital device use in our Code of Conduct (Policy 220). We also have updated guidelines coming for *Acceptable Use of Devices* for Fall 2024.

Background:

On Friday January 26, Premier Eby and Minister Singh announced a suite of initiatives focused on keeping students safe, including restricting the use of cell phones in schools.

The Ministry will work with school districts to ensure all schools have policies in place by the start of the next school year to restrict students' cell phone use in the classroom.

Many districts already address cell phones either at the district level and/or school level.

The intention of the new requirement:

- to create consistency provincially
- to create space for focused learning and interpersonal connection in the classroom with fewer distractions and interruptions
- to support students with learning how to use cell phones responsibly and respectfully.
- to help keep students safe from online threats and harmful impacts of social media.

The Ministry is currently looking at mechanisms that will require school boards to address student cell phone use potentially in their codes of conduct while ensuring School Boards have the autonomy to develop an approach that best fits their school communities' needs.

These changes will be in place for the start of the 2024/25 school year.

High Performing Systems for Tomorrow:

What is flourishing? Think of a time in your lie when ...you were flourishing. A high point when you felt most alive, most engaged, and proud of yourself and your world. What were the conditions that contributed to your flourishing?

Themes from Day 1

- Assessments need to consider additional metrics to assess student outcomes beyond academics.
- Competencies development does not replace foundational skills (literacy and numeracy) but rather builds upon them and further supports them.
- "Making Meaning" is also important not just problem solving and decision-making.
- ("Social Soil") is important for student success.
- During change, how we communicate to the sector, parents and caregivers and the broader community matters.

Themes from Day 2

- Education leaders (including teacher) are both leaders of learning and learning themselves.
- A learning environment is not just a physical space but also social, emotional, psychological, virtual, and aesthetic spaces.
- Al will have an impact on education, but there is alignment in thinking across jurisdictions on how to navigate this evolution.
- System shift involves shifting the principles on which systems are based, not just how it operates.
- This is more work to be done in the High Performing Systems for Tomorrow

2022 Global PISA Trends

- Trends in academic outcomes have remained mostly stable with recent declines in math.
- Socioeconomic gaps in education continue but poverty isn't destiny and \$ only matters to a
 point.
- Social emotional outcomes are closely related to students' success.
- Schools are being asked to do more to fill in gaps.
- Parental engagement has declined but critical.
- True critical thinking and a growth mindset are key.
- Unstructured use of technology in schools (i.e., digital distractions) is negatively associated with learning and social outcomes.






Additionally, we were very lucky to have a familiar face visit us for a day in our LFI grade 6 classroom.






BX Elementary










Indigenous Programs




International
