
# **Beairsto Elementary**

Our grade 2/3 class created a collaborative art piece using oil pastels focused on The Seven Teachings.






Our grade 5, 6 & 7 students learned about Vincent Van Gogh through our Brain Pop program. They used oil pastels to blend colours on black construction paper.

Ms. Wallace and Ms. Fochler's class enjoying some reading outside.





Many students from other divisions in the school came to visit the museum and learn from their visual arts and research.



#### **Human Resources**

On May 4, 2022, Okanagan College hosted over 400 students from SD22 for Experience OC. Students participated in fun interactive sessions led by OC Professors.


