
















Our grade 7 students do a lolli and a movie as a fundraiser. This is an enjoyable lunch time activity.

Student Learning

Our 2nd Annual Middle Years Day took place at the Board Office on May 7th where 10 teachers and 35 students from the Seaton and Fulton families of schools came together to collaborate, build, share, and play. Our theme for the day was Belonging, Community and Connections and these learners offered us information on what belonging looks like, feels like, sounds like as well as what we can do to help others feel like they belong to our secondary communities.









Five grade 12 student trustees, with the support of Learning Coordinator, Kimberley Tyssen, created an anti-racism presentation for grade 7 students. These students travelled to 7 different elementary schools and presented to over 400 grade 7 students. They created an informative and engaging presentation that involved discussions around what is racism, what is the difference between being not racist and anti-racist, and how they can be anti-racist in their school and community. These presentations were an empowering experience for the student trustees and a powerful learning opportunity for students to learn from other students. Thank you to those student trustees to show other students what it means to be anti-racist through their words and actions!



Mentorship

School District 22 has had a longstanding, rich history of professional growth and learning, which has included teacher mentorship. This program has been supported over the years by both the district and the VTA (through a Ministry grant) within a common structure of teachers supporting teachers through ongoing professional collaboration and conversations.

The Mentorship program is a three-year opportunity for teachers who are new to education, new to our district or new to a role. Mentees apply to be assigned a mentor to collaborate with around a professional learning goal.

This year Mentorship has been supported by our Learning Department, facilitated by Jen Carter (Learning Coordinator) and had over 50 Mentors/Mentees learning together.

On May 28th, students from throughout the district showcased 122 climate focused projects at the 2024 CARE Summit. Together with their mentors, students collaborated on topics related to nature & biodiversity, waste reduction, human health & culture, and others. One category, eco-friendly transportation, had several projects to encourage students to reduce their carbon footprint. Two students from Clarence Fulton Secondary, through their project Transit 4 Teens, advocate for free bussing for students under 18. They have recently been invited to the BC Minister of Transportation and train other students around the province on how to lobby their own communities. The focus of CARE is to have a ripple effect throughout the community, it is exciting to see that action take place. Our student trustees also focused on green transportation with their project highlighting GoByBike week. They ran celebration stations to encourage and reward being active and riding bikes, scooters or skateboards to school. We are proud of the work our students have done this year!
