### **April Superintendent Report 2023**

Accessible British Columbia Act — School District 22, under the leadership of Director of Instruction - Inclusion, Christine Love, is currently creating an Accessibility Committee who will assist the district in identifying barriers and advise on how to remove and prevent barriers to those individuals in the district and to those who interact with the district. The committee may include members from inside or outside of the district. Committee membership should ideally reflect the diversity of persons in BC and have at least one Indigenous person, and half of the members should ideally:

- be persons with disabilities; or,
- represent an organization that supports persons with disabilities.

Strong consideration will be given to persons who are best suited to advise on how to enhance meaningful participation by the community. Our accessibility plan will state how the school district will identify, remove, and prevent barriers to those in our district and those who interact with it. In developing or updating our district's plan, we will consult with the accessibility committee and consider specific principles:

- Inclusion
- Adaptability
- Diversity
- Collaboration
- Self-determination
- Universal design

**Anti-Racism Action Plan** - Our district is currently working on a roll out of Anti-racism education across the district for the 2023-2024 school year. The Learning Team, under the leadership of Director of Instruction – Learning, Luke Friesen, will lead this critical work.

**Communicating Student Learning (CSL) -** Assessment & Reporting - K-12 Student Reporting Policy Information for Families

The K-12 Student Reporting Policy Framework ("the framework") is the result of extensive consultation and engagement with the education sector, including rightsholders, partners, teachers, parents, caregivers, students, and the public. The framework provides an overview of the upcoming changes to the Student Reporting Policy, set to be implemented in the 2023/24 school year.

#### What's new:

- Student reporting practices that align with B.C.'s curriculum and provincial assessment system
- Ensuring timely and responsive feedback on student learning that parents can understand
- Provincial Proficiency Scale at Grades K-9
- Graduation status update at Grades 10-12
- Student self-assessment and goal setting in all grades in the 3 written reports
- Changing the "I" reporting symbol to "IE" to denote "insufficient evidence" of learning instead of "incomplete" learning
- All learners, including students with a disability or diverse ability, will receive regular communications of student learning in the same way as their peers in any other program

#### What's the same:

- 5 communications of student learning; 3 written and 2 of flexible format
- Written descriptive feedback to accompany scale or letter grade/percentage
- Letter grades and percentages at Grades 10-12

**Early Learning & Child Care** – We are delighted to announce SD 22 has been selected as part of the *Integration Inquiry Project* with the Ministry of Education and Child Care. The Integration Inquiry Project will explore the role of school districts in expanding child care on school grounds, discover the complexities of blending child care and education cultures through a single service delivery location, and emphasize quality early childhood education experiences. This project brings \$880,000 per year (2.64 million over three years) into the district and will be under the leadership of Assistant Superintendent, Katherine Oviatt and District Principal of Early Learning, Jennifer Friesen. SD 22 joins Peace River North and West Vancouver in this project.

**Expanding K-12 Career Development and Dual Credit** - <u>Budget 2023</u> confirmed over \$1.4B in investments in Future Ready and B.C.'s <u>Health Human Resources Strategy</u>, which commits to implementing new career development initiatives and expanding dual credit programming. This work will complement and build on the <u>Early Childhood Education Dual Credit project</u>, under the ChildCareBC plan, which currently includes 30 participating school districts and will continue to expand over the next two years. More information on these initiatives, as well as further clarification from the Ministry on dual credit funding eligibility, will follow in the coming weeks.

#### **Feeding Futures School Food Programs Funding**

The BC government has committed \$214.5 million in operating funding over three years to make sure all students are fed and ready to learn, by expanding existing school food programs in districts and schools that already have them and creating new ones in districts and schools without. School District 22 will receive approximately 1 million dollars. More information will be provided at the May public meeting.

Mental Health in Schools Conference – School District 22 is sending a team to the Mental Health in Schools Conference which continues the work of the *Mental Health in Schools Strategy* with K-12 sector partners, health authorities, Indigenous organizations, public and independent school representatives, and cross-ministry partners. This year's theme is *Connections* with a focus on how connections promote mental health and well-being (connection to self, connection to others, connection to the land). School District 22 is working on expanding Mental Health services to both staff and students in the 2023-2024 school year.

**Sexual Health (Consent) education requirements -** On March 6, the B.C. government introduced legislation to protect people whose intimate images are shared online without their consent. To support this legislation and to reflect feedback from educators, students, and the broader community, the Ministry of Education and Childcare, in consultation with BCTF teachers and partner Ministries, has updated the <a href="PHE curriculum">PHE curriculum</a> and the <a href="Supporting Student Health Guide">Supporting Student Health Guide</a>. This guide is available for both <a href="elementary">elementary</a> and <a href="secondary">secondary</a> schools.

We are pleased to say that School District 22 successfully rolled out *Consent Education* to all Grade 11 and 12 students this year and an Elementary version to all Elementary schools. Consent includes knowing and respecting a person's own boundaries as well as the boundaries of others. Thank you to Assistant Superintendent, Katherine Oviatt, for her leadership in this work.

#### TRC & Indigenous Graduation Requirements – coming this Fall

The new Indigenous-focused graduation requirement, which will ensure that all secondary school students graduate with knowledge of Indigenous cultures and perspectives, will be mandatory in September. **Wellness** – Did you know? School District 22 supports staff wellness with \$21,000 (approximately \$1000 to each site) for use on wellness and mental health activities and hope to nearly double those funds in 2023-2024.






# **BX Elementary**




# **Cherryville Elementary**

### **Student Learning**

#### **Learning Dept - April Superintendent's Report**

In a residency with Lindsay Forrest, students in grade 4/5 at Coldstream Elementary began Literature Circles by choosing books that interested them and getting to know their new thinking partners. Later on, they engaged in some of their own metacognition, thinking about the ways they are choosing to generate ideas on characters, events and author's intention.











Responsive teaching is informal, organic and happens in the moment. In this activity, Jen Carter is supporting formative assessment during a cuisinaire rod activity where students are exploring equivalent fractions. A simple note-taking strategy that helps to inform next steps.

**Community of Practice**: Eight French Immersion teachers from Beairsto and Harwood schools are examining the inquiry question: *How can levelled books in French Immersion be used to teach with intention, increase reciprocal gains between oral language, reading, and writing, and support literacy outcomes for all students?* Each school is using what they discover to inform teaching, learning, and assessment in the context of their early or late immersion programming.











**Early Immersion Residency:** Two grade 3 early French immersion teachers and their classes are involved in a residency with Darcy Leblanc (French Immersion Learning Coordinator) exploring the question: *How can student interest and agency be connected to creative and playful use of language?* Students have had the chance to read and learn about different genres of text (Fairy Tales, Trickster Tales, Narratives) and will choose one of interest to develop their voice, creativity, and personalize how they share their story (audio, digital, print).

Late French Immersion Residency: The two late immersion teachers and their classes are exploring the question: How can flipping the pedagogy of Guided Reading to Guided Talk be a responsive practice to support literacy development in Late French Immersion? Teachers noticed that students in Late French Immersion generally arrive to the program with very good literacy skills in their first language that transfer quickly to learning a second language; however, a lagging skill is students' ability to respond to text and to communicate their ideas, feelings and questions about text.
